In an effort to provide reliable, readily accessible, and easily understandable financial data, the financial information presented here summarizes and simplifies the presentation of information in the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report.

As a whole, the City ended 2020 in a strong financial position due to growth in overall assets, the paying down of long-term debt, and substantial growth in its general fund balance. Despite the challenges of 2020 and COVID-19, Nixa continues to maintain a strong financial position and is confident in its ability adapt to changing economic conditions should the need arise.

This report is intended to give Nixa's citizens a simplified view of the city's 2020 operations, focusing on revenues, expenses, taxes, and what is in store for their city in the near future.








Governmental Funds Summary

Enterprise Funds cover business-like activities the City operates and include the Waterworks, Wastewater, and Electric funds. While the funds are not included in this document, remember they keep the lights on, water running, and sewers flowing 24/7/365!

Sales & Use Taxes

Taxes imposed on the purchase, storage, use, or consumption of personal property or services

Contributions by other governments or organizations to support a particular function or program

Franchise Taxes

Fees on gas and cable TV companies for use of public right of way for gas or cable lines

Investment Earnings

Revenue earned by investing city funds pursuant to the city's investment policy

Charges for Services

Includes fees charged by Parks and Rec as well as charges for various city services

Property Taxes

Tax applied to the assessed value of taxable real property located within the city

Intergovernmental Taxes

Transfers to the city via proportions of the Missouri Motor Fuels Tax and Christian County Sales Tax


Other*

Includes fines collected by the city, license and permit fees, rents collected, and miscellaneous sources

Impact Fees

Fees charged to new development projects to provide revenue to support the growth they cause

Police

Includes all Nixa Police Department operations

Streets

Includes streets maintenance and projects

Capital Outlay

Spending that goes towards acquisition or construction of capital assets such as roads

General Government

Includes Administration, Municipal Court, Finance, HR, and other general city functions

Parks

Includes all Parks administration, facilities, and program spending

Sanitation

Includes city contract with a vendor for residential solid waste removal and disposal services

Debt Service

Includes principal and interest payments on the city's outstanding debt

Planning Economic / Development

Includes Planning and Zoning, Developer/Builder regulation, implementation of land use regulations, and Economic Development

Building Inspection

Includes building and occupancy inspections, code enforcement, and safety and rental inspections

Stormwater

Includes stormwater operations and projects that remove pollutants before they reach streams and rivers

In Nixa, your property taxes go to 11 different taxing districts, supporting schools, the county, the state, health programs, ambulance services, libraries, fire protection, and much more

For every \$1 in property taxes you pay, the city gets 4.95¢

This entire amount goes to the General Fund

City staff and elected officials have always and will always strive to be a high-performance government, using taxpayer dollars efficiently, transparently, and responsibly

Concerning governmental funds, Sales & Use Taxes are the city's biggest revenue source by a wide margin

For every \$1 you pay in Sales & Use Taxes, the city gets about 20¢

5¢ go to the Street Fund

15¢ go to the General Fund

Nixa & COVID-19

Throughout 2020 across the country, hundreds of cities felt the effects of COVID-19 on their government operations. However, Nixa, through residents continually supporting their local economy, was able to remain as strong as ever.

The only city fund that saw a negative effect in 2020 due to COVID-19 was our parks fund, where memberships sharply fell due to social distancing guidelines and fewer program offerings due in part to them.

Sales and uses taxes, which represent the largest portion of the city's revenues, actually increased by 37.45% from 2019 to 2020. We believe this is a testament to the hometown spirit Nixa and its citizens have, and we thank you for continuing to support each other and our local economy throughout the events of the past year.

As we continue to work through the pandemic and its challenges, our staff and council remain confident in our city and community's ability to adapt to whatever challenges may arise. Our city is in a strong financial position now and is poised to remain so in the future.




These Capital Improvement Projects and key goals were identified in the 2021-2025 Strategic Plan.

Please note, some projects are funded, others still require funding to be secured.




Roads, Sidewalks, and Connectivity
